THE PROPOSAL HIGHLIGHTS NEW, UNCONVENTIONAL, OR LESS MAINSTREAM PLANNING TOPICS OR IDEAS	30%
Emphasize how your program element will consider the complexities of planning realities or how it will tackle a familiar topic in a new way. Do not be afraid to explore ideas and topics that might seem unconventional at first glance. Cross-disciplinary projects and collaborations are encouraged. Proposals do not have to be strictly related to the planning profession but should have some relevance to planning.	
THE PROPOSAL PROVIDES MEANINGFUL OPPORTUNITY FOR ATTENDEE PARTICIPATION, INTERACTION, AND LEARNING	30%
Describe how your program element will give attendees an opportunity to contribute to the discussion. Demonstrate how the conversation will offer practical solutions to challenges facing planners today, OR how you managed challenges that you faced and what were the outcomes. Highlight how your proposal will provide learning outcomes for participants.
